Secretary's Report



Dear Dr.

The Executive Committee which met on 13-03-2005 at Thrissur discussed at length, the

issue of out-of state eye hospitals conducting eye camps in Kerala to the disadvantage of the members of Kerala Society of Ophthalmic Surgeons. There were arguments for and against taking proactive steps about this issue. While the wider interests of academics has to be considered, it is a realty that these practitioners of "cross border ophthalmic terrorism" are spoiling the scene for the common practitioner of General Ophthalmology, whose bread and butter is cataract surgery, now that the optical shops are taking away the refraction from them. May be the larger hospitals do not suffer yet.

The Executive Committee understands from reports from various districts that the following four hospitals are conducting camps in Kerala in a piratical manner.

- 1. The Aravind Eye Hospitals.
- 2. K.G.Hospital, Coimbatore.
- 3. Sankara Eye Hospital, Coimbatore
- Moses Jnanambaranam Eye Hospital, Coimbatore.

Hence the Executive Committee suggests the following plan of action to be put to practice with the cooperation of the members of KSOS.

- Avoid inviting faculty from doctors actively associated with the above mentioned institutions for our conferences and CMEs.
- Avoid attending CMEs and conferences conducted by the above mentioned institutions.
- Avoid inviting papers [for our journal/s] from them.
- Avoid using products and services manufactured or marketed [medicines, IOLs, sutures etc.] by the above mentioned institutions and display boards in one's consultation room/ hospital to that effect

Let the Ethics Committee, in consultation with the Executive Committee take appropriate action against those members who do not fall in with these guide lines.

Any hospital/ District Ophthalmic Club, proposing to conduct a CME/ workshop should write to the Hon. Gen. Secretary and/or Chairperson, Scientific Committee, with the list of proposed faculty well beforehand

I request that these suggestions be discussed thoroughly in your Ophthalmic Club and the conclusions communicated to me at the **earliest**.

Dear Friends.

Last executive committee, formed an Ethics Committee with Dr. T.A. Alexander, Dr. Charles Skariah, Dr. Sasikumar & Dr. S. Venugopal as members. At the outset we thank the KSOS for selecting us, although the job is neither easy nor pleasant.

The first complaint we have received is regarding unethical advertisements by our colleagues, to promote themselves without thinking about fellow members. Advertisement came in the form of being the first to do a procedure, or promoting a procedure tarnishing another one. The committee feels that these advertisements are likely to: Retard healthy relationship between members, Hurt feeling of fellow members, confuse the patients which may lead them to other states for treatment.

Hence we request all members to be truthful and cautious in their advertisements. One can promote one self but never at the cost of another person or technique.

neighbouring states are interested only in quantity rather than quality. They conduct eye camps in mercenary manner by hit and run surgeons to add up the number of cases, even removing clear lenses and claim benefits from more than one funding agency. This is a deplorable situation causing misery to many. I stress that we, members of KSOS should provide quality eye care even in eye camp surgery. The District Ophthalmic clubs in association with NGO's (non-government organisations) should take the initiative to organise and conduct quality eye camps in the respective districts to achieve the target. KSOS plan to promote eye camps in 4 ways:

- It will depute a senior surgeon from KSOS to supervise the camp.
 Without affidavit of supervision from KSOS no organisation shouldbe eligible to conduct eye camps inside the state.
- 3) Conducting a camp should add to CME hours. Necessary steps in this direction will be taken.
- 4) Details of camps conducted will be published in KSOS Newsletter.
- "You cannot do things differently until you see things differently".

Medical Camps

Passage of time compels us to amend certain values as exemplified by the fate of Hippocratic Oath which was reformatted. You cannot stop your fellow from going to media from announcing the starting of his clinic or arrival of newer gadgets. However advertisements in the tune of 'will cure the disease', 'offering a package for surgery', etc is definitely against medical ethics by any yardsticks. This will initiate unhealthy competition instead of peaceful coexistence. We should keep away from such practices.

I feel that I have placed before you sufficient ideas and materials to think and act on. Before I close, let me thank personally the Organising Committee Chairperson of Drishti 2004 - Dr. Shobhana Mohandas, Organising Secretary Dr. Varghese Joseph, Local Scientific Committee Chairman Dr. Roy Zacharia and other chairpersons and members of various committees, President and members of Kottayam Ophthalmic Club for the combined effort, and hard work to make this conference a memorable one.

Let me conclude with a quote from our President Sri. APJ Abdul Kalam "The person who would like to make his dreams come true must stay awake".
